From praying at the Heian shrine in Kyoto, practicing our Japanese speaking with friendly taxi drivers, to learning about the rich history of each city — it was truly an unforgettable experience that helped each of us deepen our connection to our Japanese heritage.

### TOKYO

The trip started in the beautiful and lively city of Tokyo. We spent our first full day visiting sponsors. Ms. Nakano welcomed us at Japan Airlines (JAL) and shared with us her love for the Big Island and different Japanese foods. Later we met Mr. Ouchi and Mr. Yazawa from JTB who we spoke to about tourism and Japanese New Year's traditions in Hawaii. For lunch we visited the Japan Sakura Foundation (JSF), where we were greeted by their Sakura Court members and the 70th CBF Court performed a hula for the luncheon attendees. We also had the chance to meet Mr. Hosoda, the Speaker of the House of Representatives and Japan Sakura Foundation Chairman. While visiting the Speaker's residence, we discussed the relationship between Hawaii and Japan, and learned about the variations of cherry blossoms

On our free time, we fished for our dinner at Fishing Restaurant Zauo, took many pictures walking through the teamLabs Planets museum, ate to our hearts' content at Tsukiji Fish Market, and did lots of shopping!

























### KYOTO

Next stop, Kyoto! Right when we arrived in Kyoto City, we were in awe of the perfect balance of well-kept historic monuments mixed with a modern city. Our group was greeted by Watabe Wedding Company, one of our generous sponsors who helped coordinate our Kyoto trip. Watabe Wedding President Tani joined us for a day of official visits which began with meeting the Governor of Kyoto, Mr. Nishiwaki. While taking a group photo, we taught Governor Nishiwaki how to shaka. After, we met the Deputy Mayor of Kyoto, Mr. Sakakoshi who recommended places to sightsee throughout Kyoto. We ended our first day in Kyoto by visiting Watabe Wedding's headquarters and each of the Court members were dressed in special wedding kimonos of vibrant colors and ornate designs.

The following day, our group explored the historic and cultural scenes of Kyoto with the help of our MK drivers. We visited beautiful sites, temples and shrines including the Arashiyama bamboo grove, Kitano Tenmangu, Kinkaku-Ji, Tenryuji Temple, and Kiyomizu Dera. We also made our way to the bustling Nishiki Market where we bought trinkets, kanzashi, and snacks. Our group felt completely immersed into Japanese culture and history. It was truly a remarkable visit that we're so grateful for!





























To our pleasant surprise, it just so happened that all of our sister cities were also in Kyoto attending a national JCI convention. It's been over three years since we've last seen them on the Goodwill Tour in 2019. We were so happy to briefly meet with them in between their events. We look forward to seeing them again real soon when they come to visit this spring!

### <u>HIROSHIMA</u>

Our day trip to Hiroshima began with a visit to the Hiroshima Peace Memorial Museum, where we learned about the city's history and the disastrous impacts of nuclear war. The artifacts and firsthand accounts painted a picture of this tragedy and the importance of continuing to learn and share the history. The Court then hung the 1,001 cranes we folded to symbolize the friendship between Japan and Hawaii. We registered our cranes and wrote a message of peace and aloha to submit to the database. Before making our way back to Kyoto, our group indulged in okonomiyaki — a savory pancake dish that Hiroshima is well-known for. A few of us enjoyed oyster okonomiyaki which is a mixture of Hiroshima specialties. While a short visit, Hiroshima was such a special place to visit and we're grateful for the opportunity to learn about an important part of our history.

After three long years, we are excited to welcome our sister cities back to Hawaii this spring! Inspired by this year's theme and it's meaning of "lasting connections", we wanted the design to reflect on the connections we make through the festival and how each of our lives are interwoven with one another from the moment we meet.

The knot displayed is an "ume-musubi" knot, "ume" or "plum" flowers are often celebrated as a protective charm against evil, the trees are are very resilient, thriving in all climates, from inner city parks to remote frosty mountain tops. A wonderful reminder that happiness and compassion can thrive and bloom in even the harshest conditions. The three cords used in the knot symbolize the past, present and future, allowing us to look back on the relationships and connections that are at the foundation of this long lasting tradition. ### Japanese Culture: Daito Water Throwing Festival (大東大原水かけ祭り)

Throughout the year, festivals occur across Japan to pray for prosperity, ward off bad spirits, and show gratitude to ancestors. The Daito Ohara Mizukake Matsuri has been a traditional festival in Ohara, Iwate Prefecture, and is considered one of the most eccentric festivals in Japan because it is held in the coldest month of the year. Due to the Edo Castle Fire in 1657, this festival was created to pray for fire prevention and protection. For 350 years it has been a tradition for men of 25 and 42 years old, unlucky yakudoshi years for men, to bravely run half naked through the streets while being splashed with cold water by people along the roadside. The water symbolizes purification and acts as protection during their yakudoshi year. As the participants run, they pray for good health and safety for themselves and their families.
