


#### MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

#### **SPRING IN JAPAN**

When you hear "spring" in Japan, one of the first things that will come to mind may be sakura or cherry blossoms. Why is sakura so meaningful in Japanese culture?

Cherry blossoms have various meanings in Japanese culture, but a primary one is "life is fleeting." Cherry blossoms are beautiful to see when they are fully bloomed, however, the trees and flowers are short-lived. Cherry blossoms only bloom for a few weeks before withering and falling. Just like the blooming period of sakura, we are reminded that life is short and precious at the same time. It also symbolizes renewal and hope as the return of spring.

People in Japan cherish sakura during their flowering period and even have "watching blossom" parties, also known as hanami. Yozakura is hanami at night, where people view the beautiful cherry blossom trees at night.

If you are planning to visit Japan in the spring, you may be in for an adventure if searching for sakura! Sakura bloom at different times throughout the nation due to climate differences. While their bloom may be short-lived in one place, you can go on an adventure and search for cherry blossoms in another city!
