GOODWILL TOUR 2023

Bright and early on departure day, representatives from Cherry Blossom Festival Diamond Sponsor, Japan Airlines, and Silver Sponsor, JTB Hawaii, greeted our group at the airport and made sure our check-in process went smoothly. Because of Japan Airlines' generosity, we were able to relax in the fabulous Sakura Lounge before our long flight to Kansai Airport.

Kobe

Right when we arrived, we were warmly greeted by members of our sister chapter Kobe JC. We kicked off our first night in Japan with a GWT group dinner at an izakaya restaurant in Kobe City and indulged in delicious seafood. We hit the ground running on our first full day in Kobe. Our Official Party accompanied Kobe JC President, Daisuke Miyazaki, and a few of his board members to meet with the Vice Mayor of Kobe City, Masao Imanishi. The rest of the GWT group went on a city walk and stopped at a Kobe JC member's family's senbei ("rice cracker") shop that has been around for 150 years. The full group reunited at lunch, then went to do some shopping at Aeon Mall Kobe Kita and Kobe Sanda Premium Outlet. Later in the evening, we attended a welcome dinner and had a blast playing icebreaker games with the Kobe members.

The next day we visited Yorakuji Temple, run by Kobe JC past president, Kenjo Kai. Kenjo shared with the group about the history of the temple and the importance of Buddhism to Japanese people. We also participated in a shodo ("calligraphy") activity and learned how to write 'Hawaii' and 'Kobe' in Japanese. After lunch, we were able to pound and make mochi with Kobe members. It was a perfect post-lunch activity and dessert! At the farewell dinner, we continued making new friendships and memories with the Kobe JC members. The banquet room was filled with uncontrollable laughter as we played a tournament of charades. From the moment we landed in Japan, until we departed Shin-Kobe station, the Kobe JC members made sure our time with them was nothing short of amazing. Thank you to President Miyazaki and the Kobe JC members for being outstanding hosts!





Kyoto

After Kobe, the Official Party spent time in historic Kyoto to thank longtime CBF sponsor, Watabe Wedding. The Official Party group, along with Watabe Wedding President and CEO Masayuki Miyase and other Watabe Wedding executives, met with Kyoto Governor Takatoshi Nishiwaki and received a tour of the former main building of the Kyoto Prefectural Office. Later that night, a kaiseki ("traditional Japanese multi-course") dinner was hosted at Watabe Wedding's famous wedding venue, Okakuen. The Official Party was able to spend quality time getting to know President Miyase and his executives. The Court was able to be dressed in beautiful wedding furisode kimono! What a memorable experience!

The next day was time for sightseeing! The Official Party visited famous sites such as Fushimi Inari Taisha, Kinkaku-ji, and Kiyomizu-dera, and shopped around the Ninen-zaka and Sannen-zaka streets. Lunch was a guick stop at Nigiri Chojiro! Our MK driver/guide was incredible for braving the weather with us and made sure we had an enjoyable time!

Kurashiki

Our next destination was Okayama prefecture to see our San JC sister chapters of Kurashiki, Kojima, and Tamashima! Right when we arrived at Shin-Kurashiki station, the San JC members were waiting for us on the platform and arranged a welcome concert by a saxophone quartet of very talented college students. After lunch, we had fun making customized tatami mat squares with colorful tatami-beri borders that were provided respectively by Kurashiki JC President Kana Tokura and a Kojima JC member. After the activity, we had a tour of a graduated San JC member's family distillery, Kikuchi Sake Distillery, and was able to taste four of their popular sake with food pairings. Later that night, as the rest of the GWT attended a welcome dinner in Tamashima, the 71st CBF Court had a unique opportunity to be hosted by two members' families! They were able to stay with their host families, play games, and share stories. It was one of the best experiences during the trip!

We spent the next day in Kojima. We walked around the annual Senn-sai Textile Festival and ate yummy street food from the yatai stalls. After the festival, we stopped at the famous Kojima Jean Street and enjoyed some shopping time. Our tour in Kojima ended at Matsui Orimono, a local tatami-beri border company run by a Kojima JC member and his family. We were amazed how the machines manufacture the beautiful tatami-beri designs, and even more impressed to hear most of the machines are more than 50 years old! At the end of the demonstration, we decorated a Christmas tree with various tatami-beri. The tree was shared in an article in the local newspaper during the holidays. At the farewell dinner in Kurashiki, we had a fabulous time reflecting on the past couple of days of activities and made the most out of our last night together. We were very happy to see Mr. Yoshimura and Mr. Akiyama, former San JC members who had a hand in starting our sister chapter relationship 39 years ago. During the dinner program, the San JC presidents presented a donation to aid Maui's recovery from the wildfires. We are grateful for our sister chapter's heartfelt care and generosity to our local community during such a devastating time.

Before jumping on the shinkansen to Hiroshima, the Official Party had the opportunity to meet Kurashiki Deputy Mayor Hara Takashi and learned about the incredible history of Kurashiki. We had a little time after lunch to walk around Kurashiki's famous Bikan Chiku Historical Quarter and took in the quintessential scenery of the canal and stone roof tile buildings. Thank you to Kurashiki JC President Tokura, Kojima JC President Tsubomoto, and Tamashima JC President Nishi, and the San JC members for showing us the rich culture and history of your cities. We had a spectacular time!

Hiroshima

The next stop on the Goodwill Tour was Hiroshima. The 71st CBF Court presented 1,000 origami cranes - folded by the 71st CBF semifinalists - at the Children's Peace Monument, then spent time walking through the Peace Memorial Museum. It was a somber experience, but an important time to reflect and remember a tragic part of history. After going through the museum, we had time to explore Hiroshima and have some okonomiyaki! It was a brief, yet memorable trip to this famous city!





Odawara

Next, we headed to Kanagawa prefecture to see our last, but certainly not least, sister chapter, the Odawara JC. We spent the day touring the neighboring town of Yugawara. At lunch, we were welcomed by Yugawara Town Deputy Mayor Tadashi Takahashi, and he shared with our group what makes Yugawara special. To end our Yugawara tour, we went mikan picking at a local farm that overlooked Sagami Bay. That night, we had a delicious yakiniku course dinner at the welcome party and enjoyed meeting more of the Odawara JC members.

On our second day, we went on a guided tour of Okubo Jinja, a Shinto shrine, and Odawara Castle. Coincidentally, we were at the castle grounds during a kiku ("chrysanthemum") festival and got to see astounding flowers of various colors. The tour built up our appetites, and we were lucky to indulge in the freshest seafood dishes at an Odawara JC member's restaurant. After lunch, we took a scenic train ride to Hakone and went on a koyo ("autumn leaves") walk at Hakone Gora Park. That night, we kicked off the evening's festivities with a friendly bowling competition at Korona Cat Bowl. It was so much fun being teamed up with Odawara members and seeing everyone's different techniques of throwing the bowling ball down the alley. At the farewell party, an Odawara halau performed dazzling hula numbers, and we had our traditional pantyhose tug-o-war competition. The next morning before we had to leave for Tokyo, we visited the Suzuhiro Kamaboko Museum and learned how to make our own kamaboko in various shapes. Thank you to President Tanaka and the Odawara JC members for making our time together so memorable!

Tokyo

Our last stop of the Goodwill Tour was Tokyo! On our first full day, the Official Party had the honor of meeting with Her Imperial Highness Crown Princess Akishino at the Imperial Palace. It was truly a very special experience to converse with Kiko-sama and share with her some of the highlights of our trip.

In the afternoon, the Official Party attended important meetings to thank two generous and longtime Festival sponsors, Japan Airlines and JTB. At the Japan Airlines Headquarters, we had the opportunity to meet with Executive Officer & Deputy Senior Vice President of Sales and Marketing, Hoshiko Nakano, and other executives. 
