## Japanese Culture

#### Obon

Obon is an annual Japanese holiday for commemorating ancestors. It is believed that during this time, spirits return to visit their relatives. Customs will vary from region to region, but typically, *chochin* (lanterns) are hung to guide the ancestors' spirits home and *bon odori* (bon dances) are performed. Families will gather, visit graves, and place food offerings at home alters and temples. At the end of Obon, floating lanterns are released into rivers and seas to help guide spirits back to their world.





Obon is observed from the 13th to the 15th day of the 7th month of the year, which some celebrate in mid-July based on the solar calendar. Others base it off the lunar calendar and celebrate it in mid-August. Japan's official 2020 dates are August 13th – 15th.

The Obon week is one of Japan's three major holiday seasons (with New Year and Golden Week), making it one of the busiest times of the year for traveling. Many Japanese people will leave their cities around August 10th and return back around August 17th.
